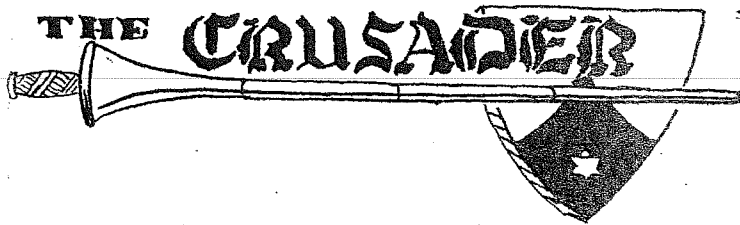

Among our new teachers is the composer of our school Alma Mater, Fr. Kenneth McElligot, O. Carm.

Fr. Kenneth hails from the Bronx, where his parents still reside.

While living in New York Fr. Kenneth attended Mount Saint Michael's High School for one year. He continued his education at Saint Albert's Junior Seminary in Middletown, N. Y., followed by three years at the former Carmelite House of studies in Auburn. During his stay here, he served as Director of Music for one year. It was at this time that Fr. Kenneth's interest in music led him to compose the Mount Carmel Alma Mater.

Fr. Kenneth was then sent to Rome, Italy, where he pursued courses in theology, philosophy, and Mariology (the Study of the Blessed Virgin Mary).

During his stay in Europe, Fr. Kenneth spent a month in Switzerland studying German, and a similar one in Paris learning the French language.

During his stay in Italy, Fr. Kenneth taught a summer course in Geometry to Italian students.

At the end of four years study in Italy, Fr. Kenneth received a Baccalaureate Degree in Theology from the Lateran University of Rome. The Schola Sancti Thomae (School of Saint Thomas) in Rome, awarded him a diploma.

Father Kenneth was ordained in 1961. He returned to the U.S. in 1962, and taught at St. Albert's Seminary in Middletown, New York. He holds a Bachelor of Arts Degree from St. Bonaventure University and he is currently working on his Master of Arts in English from the same University.

Giving his impressions of the school Fr. Kenneth said, "There is great potential here at Carmel. I hope I can do my share in helping the students to realize this potential."

Two Saturday's ago the Panthers of Geneva tripped the Crusaders by a score of 18-12.

Geneva's three touchdowns were scored by junior half-back Jim Trickler from 18, 15, and 16 yards out.

Carmel's two tallies came on 30 yard pass combinations from Denny Zanowick to ends Roger Beer and Mike Didio.

Outstanding on offense and defense for the Crusaders in both games were Roger Beer, Dave Fennessey, Kirk Walker, Denny Zanowick, Neil Salvage, Johnny Vergamini, Mike Colella, Mike Kenney, Mike Didio, Brad Clifford and Jack Burns.

BETTER RECORD FOR J-V'S

Mount Carmel's jayvees have taken victories from two out of three opponents, DeSales and Geneva High. They dropped a decision to Clyde Central.

In the first game, with DeSales, Carmel won 26-6. The elusive halfbacks Jim Cotter and Paul Picciano both made sensational touchdown runs, Cotter for two. Also scoring for Carmel was quarterback Mike Saunders.

In the second game with Clyde, Carmel lost to the Blue Devils 23-13. An impressive 90 yard punt return by Dick Rusinko put Carmel out in front early in the game.

Later in the first half two touchdown passes were thrown by Clyde's quarterback Steve Bastian to give Clyde the edge.

A third quarter pass play by Bastian put Clyde

in the lead 20-13.

In the fourth period Paul Picciano scored to recover the lead 20-13.

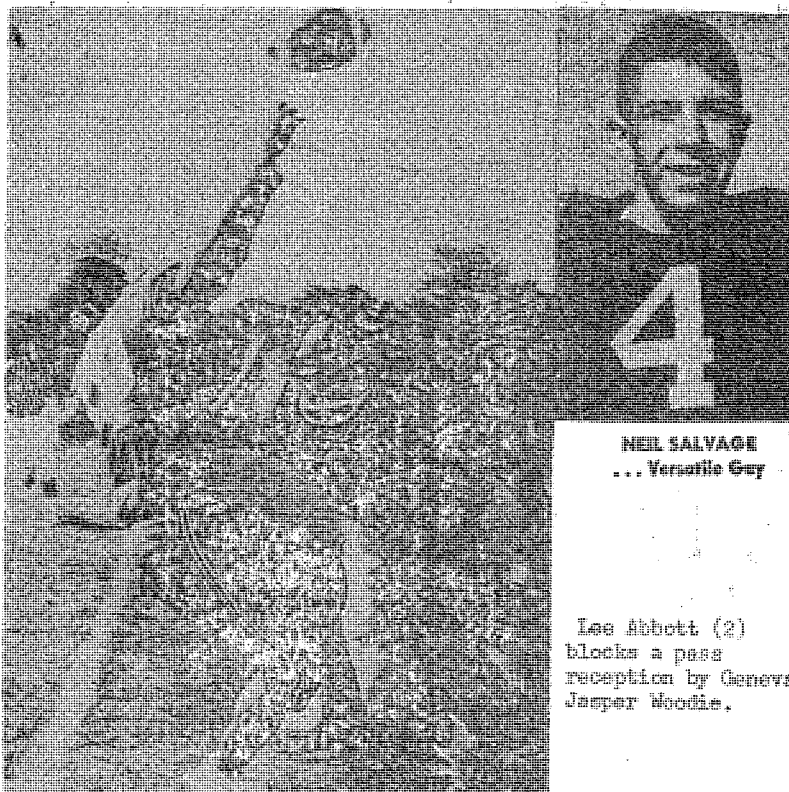
Carmel moved close to the goal line late in the period but was unable to score.

Late in the first half, halfbacks Paul Picciano and Jim Cotter made long gains, to put the proteges of Mike Cuddy on the Geneva 4 yard line. Saunders again went off tackle for his second touchdown.
