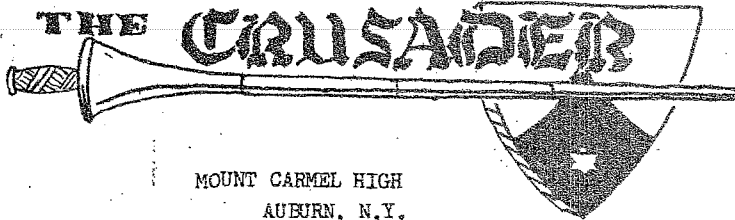

FR. MALACHY DECLARES 'SERVING 700 ISN'T EASY'

The problem: serve a full dinner to 700 people in less than 15 minutes; then, clear the tables in a little more than 20 minutes. This was the task which confronted Fr. Malachy on Wednesday evening, Oct. 23, when the city's annual Victory Dinner for the United Community Appeal was held in Mr. Carmel's gymnasium.

Flanked by a crew of Carmel students, along with assistance from members of the Carmel Mens' and Ladies' Clubs, Father Malachy was able to serve the meal in about 14 minutes. "The students were just a few minutes over last year's time, but they still merit some sort of medal for efficiency," stated Mrs. Rocco Malvaso, head of the serving committee.

Serving the meal was only a small part of the entire project which Father Malachy undertook. The gymnasium had to be decorated for the affair, a task which last year had cost the United Fund Committee, when an interior decorator was hired for the job, over five hundred dollars.

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Patricia Foster and Eileen Scanlon, seniors, represented the school at the New York State Health Conference held in Rochester, October 11-12.

Patty and Eileen arrived at the Rochester Sheraton Hotel where they stayed during the conference Friday morning. After an opening luncheon at the hotel, they toured Rochester State Hospital and were shown a film pertaining to it. A question-and-answer period followed.

That evening, the representatives attended a banquet held in their honor, which featured James Miller, Wrestling Coach at Cornell University, who spoke on the topic of "Physical and Mental Fitness."

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This week, Father Daniel Lynch, O. Carm Student Council Financial Moderator, made official the success of the school's annual Magazine Drive, in announcing that during the three week drive, a total of \$11,649 in magazine subscriptions had been solicited by Carmel students.

The drive was conducted in conjunction with the Catholic Digest, and their National Catholic Decency in Reading program.

Mr. Roberts Roser, a representative of the Catholic Digest, assisted the Student Council in managing the drive. A kickoff rally was held for Carmel students on Tuesday, September 23, with Fr. Daniel presiding, assisted by Council President and Vice-President Kirk Walker and Anna Walton, managers of the drive. Father Daniel introduced Mr. Roser, who donned a pirate's costume appropriate to this year's theme—"Pirate and Treasure," and displayed "High Sales prizes to the students."

At a special Victory Rally, which marked the culmination of the drive, held several weeks ago, Fr. Daniel awarded prizes and trophies to high salesmen and the top homeroom and announced

Many complaints, through many channels, have reached me during the last month and especially the last two weeks, concerning the night-time activities of local teen-agers, particularly Mount Carmel students. Upon investigation, it has been found that most of these complaints were over the conduct of only a few students and these activities were usually held at unreasonably late hours. The conduct of a few is giving a bad reputation to all--which is unfair. I would propose a community-wide curfew for the following reasons:

- (1) A reasonable curfew would not change the recreational hours of most of our good teen-agers but would force the offending few to keep decent hours. This would curtail their unwholesome late-hour antics and not let them color the reputation of the many in the eyes of the adults of our community.
- (2) A reasonable curfew places no real restrictions on most teen-agers.

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 Next came preparation of the actual dinner. Mrs. Rose Rozmyslovick, four school cook, and her kitchen crew prepared a am dinner which won compliments from everybody who attended the rally.

After the excitement had ended, a job in it self had begun for Fr. Malachy and the students who helped him clean-up. Loads and loads of chairs and tables along with silverware and chinaware had to be returned to the parishes and to the school halls where they were borrowed from. Decorations had to be removed before the Seniors took their Air-Force aptitude exam in the cafeteria on the following morning.

When all the work had been completed, Fr. Malachy thanked all the students who had helped hem, and gave a sigh of relief that the task was finished.

The Auburn group is now in a course which will enable them to teach such children, following 30 weeks of concentrated study in Catholic Doctrine.

STUDENTS CELEBRATE "CHRIST THE KING"

"Lord Jesus Christ, King of Kings and Lord of lords, we joyously acknowledge Your universal sovereignty over us all..."

These words opened the Christ the King ceremony held last Thursday afternoon, October 24, in the gymnasium. All the faculty and student body participated in the ceremony held to precelebrate the Feast of Christ the King. The service consisted of a reading of the Gospel of the feast, a prayer for the acknowledgment of Christ's Kingship over the Church, the diocese and especially over Mount Carmel High School.

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Representatives from each student organization individually asked Christ to be King over their Clubs.

The ceremony ended with a special prayer for the United States and civil authorities, followed by the Benediction and singing of some hymns by the students. Father Bartholomew, O.Carm. officiated.

According to Sister Jogues who helped organize the ceremony, "As we live in the spirit of the Ecumenical Council, it is necessary that we individually acknowledge the Kingship of Christ over all men. We hope this ceremony helped each student realize God's Kingship."

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(3) Unless it is a community-wide agreement, many teenagers work on parents to permit them to stay out late "because everybody does".

(4) A curfew protects the majority of teenagers from much of the criticism directed at all of them because of the late hours kept by a few.

(5) Activities carried out during very late hours are usually not wholesome activities. Often they lead to much trouble for which all teenagers are blamed.

ed that a free day (the first day of the fall hunting season) would be awarded to the student body as a token of appreciation by the Student Council

At the opening rally, Fr. Daniel explained that the drive would last 12 school days, and students would be assessed a quota of \$15 each, to aid in reaching the \$10,000 goal which was planned for the drive's success.

In the three weeks which followed, students canvassed the city, selling both Catholic and secular magazine subscriptions to patrons, and made returns to homeroom captains.

Fr. Daniel said that of the eleven thousand dollars that Carmel students brought in, \$3,673 will be kept by Mt. Carmel. He added that this was largely due to the efforts of the Senior class, who were first in class competition with \$2.50 per person over their goal in sales. He said that their efforts were followed by those of the other classes.

He congratulated the individual salesman, who had achieved high sales in the drive, particularly the brother-sister team of Gail Asam and Richard Asam, who brought in \$260. and \$100. respectively. He mentioned other students, such as Kathy Burke, with \$185. in sales, Cynthia Plis with \$127., Patricia O'Connell, \$117., Karen Wilson, \$117., Barbara O'Connell, \$114., Mary Anne Gonza, \$111., John Masley, \$105., Barbara Byrne, \$101., Joseph Ganley, \$101., Joanne Walczek, \$101., Thomas Russo, and John Szakalski both with \$100. in sales.

Fr. Daniel concluded by congratulating Sophomore girl room 23 with \$100. and Senior boys homeroom 13, with \$713.16 in sales, both of which will be given a Victory Dinner at the Spring-side Inn in the near future.

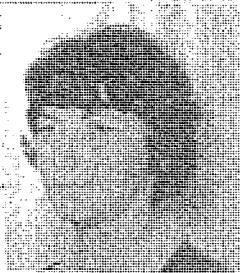
The first score came at the 11:30 mark of the second quarter when ace quarterback Cliff Tompkins scampered in from three yards
